Morse Code is a type of communication. It uses dots, dashes, and spaces to represent letters and numbers. These dots and dashes are arranged to spell out a message.

In World War II, Morse Code was used to send important messages. Battleships and war planes could communicate over long distances and pass on information back to mainland Britain.

When the war in Europe ended on 8th May 1945, people all around the country celebrated with special Victory in Europe street parties.
